April Board Meeting Highlights

Membership currently stands at 503. Walkowiak reported that State Nursery sales are down (2.5 million this year vs. 3.4 million last year) apparently due to cost-share cutbacks and high farmland prices and updated us on Forest Reserve. Field Day plans were discussed. Sparks offered to do the in-house audit for IWOA, a task which is required by law for non-profits. The IWOA membership brochure is being redesigned and printed in time for the July Field Day and the State Fair.

NWOA notes that only 1-in-5 timber sales involves a forester, and they urge the use of foresters to realize both good money and good forestry.

- www.timbertax.com - will list tax specialists with expertise in timber tax and who have credentials. The National Timber Tax Website www.timbertax.net of which NWOA is a partner, provides information, but no names of tax practitioners.
- www.logprice.com - will concentrate on log prices delivered at the mill, not stumpage. Prices vary greatly from state to state plus states use different log measure scales, so prices will not be readily comparable without conversion factors.

Nutty Apple Muffins

When I first tasted these apple and walnut muffins, I knew I would have the recipe among my favorites. People love these.

|-----------------------|--------------------------|
| 1 1/2 t. baking soda | 1 1/4 c. sugar |
| 1/2 t. salt | 1/3 c. vegetable oil |
| 1/2 t. ground nutmeg | 2 c. diced peeled apples |
| 2 eggs | 1 1/2 c. chopped walnuts |
| 3/4 c. flaked coconut | |

Mix together eggs, sugar, oil. Stir in apples, walnuts, and coconut. Add mixed dry ingredients and blend just until dry

ingredients are moist. Don't worry about a few lumps. Put in greased muffin cups. Fill 3/4 full. Bake at 350 for 25-30 minutes. Cool 10 minutes before removing from pan.

Elm Trees on Trial in Iowa

Could an Elm Tree Revival Be Possible?

(excerpted and summarized from the article that appeared in the Quad City Times, May 15, 2005)

Mark Gleason of ISU Extension reports “plant pathologists are leading an elm revival. For decades, plant breeders have been quietly seeking elms that can fight off Dutch elm disease. Today, we finally have some elms that could re-take the urban landscape.”

True American elms with naturally high levels of resistance to Dutch elm disease include Independence, New Harmony, and Valley Forge.

Others are Asian imports with built-in resistance, since they evolved with the fungus over many millennia. Still others are hybrids of Asian and American elms.

Elms slow to be accepted again

The elm comeback, says Gleason, has been a slow and cautious one. People who harbor painful memories of the Dutch elm disease epidemic may see elms as too risky.

You can find some of the disease-resistant elms in larger garden centers, in catalogs, and online, but you have to look pretty hard.

ISU Research Project to Test Elm Hardiness

The need to know about the new elms was the driving force behind the National Elm Trial. Fourteen elm cultivars, all resistant to Dutch elm disease, are being planted this spring at 19 locations throughout the U.S.

The trees will be researched over the next 15 years, testing their hardiness and tolerance to such pests as the elm leaf beetle and elm yellows disease.

In Iowa, the National Elm Trial trees are being planted at the Iowa State University Horticulture Research Farm near Gilbert, north of Ames. The public is welcome to visit the planting on weekdays from 8-4. Call the Horticulture Research Farm at 515.232.1978 or Mark Gleason at 515.294.0579 for directions.
